During every legislative session, Planned Parenthood Advocates of Virginia (PPAV) lobbies members of the Virginia Senate and House of Delegates to protect and expand access to reproductive health care and rights. This Reproductive Rights Report documents legislators' votes on key reproductive rights issues during the 2011 General Assembly session. We hope that you will use this information to communicate with your legislators about their votes and your support for reproductive rights. The votes of Senate and House members are recorded using the legislative issues identified on the following pages.

2011 GENERAL ASSEMBLY LEGISLATIVE SESSION

Forgetting their promises of job creation, strengthening the economy and passing a budget that would make Virginia's government smaller, more efficient and save taxpayer dollars, many elected officials focused on attacking women's rights and making it more difficult to access essential reproductive health services.

The House of Delegates remained under Republican control with an even larger margin than in past years (59-R, 39-D, 2-I). The Senate make-up changed slightly this session. However, the Senate does remain under Democratic control (22-D, 18-R) but without a pro-choice majority.

This General Assembly session was a short, 45 day session, during which the Virginia legislature launched an extensive attack on women. In all, Planned Parenthood worked to defeat ten anti-choice bills and five budget amendments that threatened access to reproductive health care, prevention services and the perennial attempt to defund Planned Parenthood.

Some of these bills were among the most extreme in the nation—many lacked exemptions for women facing threats to their health or coping with fetal anomaly, or did not contain exemptions for pregnancies that are the result of rape or incest. SB924, Targeted Regulations for Abortion Providers, which had been defeated for two decades, passed. This bill was part of an unprecedented political campaign to undermine women's access to safe, legal abortion services. While we know that the effect of SB 924 will depend on the regulations produced by the Board of Health in September 2011, we trust that the regulations coming out of this process will reflect medicine and not politics, ensuring that thousands of women in the Commonwealth can obtain health care from their trusted provider.

Additionally, Governor Bob McDonnell (R-VA) included a last-minute attack on women's access to a full range of reproductive health care in

the forthcoming health insurance exchange and reestablished funding for failed Title V abstinence-only education programs. Although the federal health care law already bans abortion from coverage, the Governor and legislature reiterated this unnecessary measure after it failed to pass in the traditional legislative process. The Governor also used the budget process to reintroduce funding for abstinence-only education. While funding for comprehensive sexuality education would cost the Commonwealth nothing upfront and potentially save thousands of dollars annually in health care expenses, Title V requires a state match that could equal as much as \$890,000. In addition to the wasteful spending of taxpayers' money, these failed programs could result in increased rates of unintended pregnancy and disease transmission.

In years past, we have also sought to introduce common sense proactive measures that give women, teens and families control over their reproductive lives and futures. This year we introduced SB 967, patroned by Sen. Ralph Northam (D-6) to ensure all students in the Commonwealth receive Family Life Education in the classroom and that all curricula or materials used are evidence-based and supported by peer reviewed medical research. Our bill passed the Senate, but was ultimately killed in the House Education subcommittee. We will continue to introduce common sense legislation and encourage our leaders in Virginia to implement preventive approaches to reproductive health care.

For more than 70 years, Planned Parenthood health centers across Virginia have served tens of thousands of patients. The overwhelming majority of Planned Parenthood's services are preventive, including cancer screenings, annual gynecological exams, family planning counseling and services, and testing and treatment for sexually transmitted infections.

KEY LEGISLATIVE PRIORITIES FOR THE HOUSE OF DELEGATES

Hospital Licensing Requirement Amendment to SB 924 (anti-choice measure)

Patron: Senator Ryan T. McDougle (R-4)

Originally, SB 924 was not related to the regulation of abortion providers but rather hospitals and nursing homes. However, a TRAP-like amendment was tacked onto SB 924 in the waning days of the General Assembly session by Del. Kathy Byron (R-22). The amendment requires facilities in which 5 or more first trimester abortions per month are performed to be classified as a 'hospital'. The bill also states that the Board of Health shall promulgate regulations to implement the provisions of this act to be effective within 280 days of its enactment. After the amendment passed the House (63-Y, 34-N), the bill passed the Senate (20-Y, 20-N). Lt. Governor Bolling broke the tie with a "YEA" vote and the amendment was passed and has been signed into law by Governor McDonnell.

Health Benefits Exchanges; Abortion Coverage Not Permitted Amendment to HB 2434 (anti-choice measure)

Patron: Delegate Terry G. Kilgore (R-1)

Initially, a bill dealing with the establishment of a state-based health care exchange, as required by the federal Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act, was introduced to the legislature. During the final days of veto session, HB 2434 was amended by Governor McDonnell. His amendment bans private insurance companies who will participate in the health care exchange from covering abortion care, except in the cases of rape, incest, or when the life of the woman is in danger. This amendment does not have any exceptions for the health of the mother or fetal abnormalities. This bill passed the House (61-Y, 36-N, 3-A) and the Senate (20Y, 20-N). Lt. Governor Bolling broke the tie with a "YEA" vote and the amendment was passed and has been signed into law by Governor McDonnell.

Eliminating the HPV Vaccination; HB 1419 (anti-choice measure)

Patron: Delegate Kathy J. Byron (R-22)

This bill would have eliminated the requirement that girls entering the 6th grade receive the Human Papillomavirus (HPV) vaccine. In April of 2007, Virginia became a leader in cancer prevention when Governor Kaine approved and enacted a bill, with overwhelming bi-partisan support, that added the HPV vaccine to the Virginia Board of Health's list of required immunizations for attendance to public or private schools. As with other immunization

requirements, the HPV requirement includes an opt-out provision for parents who object to this vaccination. The best way to continue to decrease the number of women who acquire the HPV virus is to protect our daughters by making sure the HPV vaccine is available to all young women, regardless of socioeconomic status, before they are at risk of infection. This bill passed the House (61-Y, 33-N, 1-A), but was fortunately defeated in the Senate Education and Health committee (12-Y, 3-N).

**Abstinence-Only Funding Budget Amendment to House Budget Bill 1500
(anti-choice measure)**

Patron: Delegate Lacey E. Putney (I-19)

As part of Governor McDonnell's 2010-2012 budget, he included an amendment that restores almost \$890,000 for Title V abstinence-only programs. This amendment is fiscally irresponsible given that Governor McDonnell declined to apply for PREP (Personal Responsibility Education Programs) funding last summer. PREP funding would have provided evidence-based comprehensive programs, at no cost to the state, that help young people gain the knowledge and skills they need to take personal responsibility for their reproductive and sexual health. This bill passed the House (61-Y, 36-N, 3-A) and the Senate (20-Y, 20-N). Lt. KEY LEGISLATIVE PRIORITIES FOR THE SENATE OF VIRGINIA

Hospital Licensing Requirement Amendment to SB 924 (anti-choice measure)

Patron: Senator Ryan T. McDougle (R-4)

Originally, SB 924 was not related to the regulation of abortion providers but rather hospitals and nursing homes. However, a TRAP-like amendment was tacked onto SB 924 in the waning days of the General Assembly session by Del. Kathy Byron (R-22). The amendment requires facilities in which 5 or more first trimester abortions per month are performed to be classified as a 'hospital'. The bill also states that the Board of Health shall promulgate regulations to implement the provisions of this act to be effective within 280 days of its enactment. After the amendment passed the House (63-Y, 34-N) the bill passed the Senate (20-Y, 20-N). Lt. Governor Bolling broke the tie with a "YEA" vote and the amendment was passed and has been signed into law by Governor McDonnell.

Health Benefits Exchanges; Abortion Coverage Not Permitted Amendment to HB 2434 (anti-choice measure)

Patron: Delegate Terry G. Kilgore (R-1)

Initially, a bill dealing with the establishment of a state-based health care exchange, as required by the federal Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act, was introduced to the legislature. During the final days of veto session, HB 2434 was amended by Governor McDonnell. This amendment does not have any exceptions for the health of the mother or fetal abnormalities. This bill passed the House (61-Y, 36-N, 3-A) and the Senate (20Y, 20-N). Lt. Governor Bolling broke the tie with a "YEA" vote and the amendment was passed and has been signed into law by Governor McDonnell.

Abstinence-Only Funding Budget Amendment to House Budget Bill 1500 (anti-choice measure)

Patron: Delegate Lacey E. Putney (I-19)

As part of Governor McDonnell's 2010-2012 budget, he included an amendment that restores almost \$890,000 for Title V abstinence-only programs. This amendment is fiscally irresponsible given that Governor McDonnell declined to apply for PREP (Personal Responsibility Education Programs) funding just last

summer. PREP funding would have provided evidence-based comprehensive programs, at no cost to the state, that help young people gain the knowledge and skills they need to take personal responsibility for their reproductive and sexual health. This amendment passed the House (69-Y, 29-N) and the Senate (20-Y, 20-N).). Lt. Governor Bolling broke the tie with a “YEA” vote and the amendment was passed and has been signed into law by Governor McDonnell.

Family Life Education; SB 967 (pro-choice measure)

Patron: Senator Ralph S. Northam (D-6)

This bill would have required each school division to implement the standards of learning for the Family Life Education program promulgated by the Board of Education, or a program consistent with the guidelines developed by the Board, which would have the goals of reducing the incidence of pregnancy, sexually transmitted disease, and substance abuse among teenagers. It also stated that any curricula or materials used in the classroom must be evidence-based and supported by peer reviewed medical research. This bill passed the Senate (24-Y-19-N), but was left in the House Education subcommittee (4-Y, 4-N).

House Honor Roll



Delegate Charniele L. Herring (D-46) gathered pro-choice Democrats at a press conference to speak against the Governor’s amendment to HB 2434 that would prohibit private insurance companies participating in the state-based health care exchange from providing abortion coverage, except for the narrow instances of rape, incest and life of the mother. She also led the debate against the amendment on the House floor. In 2011, she also introduced legislation that would not have a negative impact on private insurance companies that want to provide abortion coverage. Her bill stated that any qualified health benefits plan offered through an exchange shall **be neither required to provide nor prohibited from providing insurance coverage for abortion services.**

Delegate David L. Englin (D-45) was a champion for women’s health this session when a last minute attempt was made to require facilities in which 5 or more first trimester abortions per month are performed to be classified as a ‘hospital’. He spoke on the House floor to defend health centers that provide abortions, stating that the bill was “an attack on women’s access to safe legal abortion and not about women’s health and safety”.



Delegate Adam Ebbin (D-49) offered a budget amendment to provide funding for the coverage of pregnant women who are lawfully residing in the US and currently not eligible for FAMIS coverage until they have lived in the United States for five years. Federal reauthorization of the Children’s Health Insurance Program allows states to offer coverage for this population. It is expected that this change will improve birth outcomes and reduce the cost of uncompensated care by providing prenatal, labor and delivery services.



Delegate Vivian E. Watts (D-39) continues to be one of Planned Parenthood’s staunchest pro-choice champions on the floor. Her impassioned floor speeches range from discussing the implications of giving a fetus all the rights, privileges, and immunities available to other persons to discussing the consequences of not offering the HPV vaccination to young girls entering the 6th grade.

Delegate Jennifer L. McClellan (D-71) was a leader this session speaking against anti-choice bills in both committee and on the floor. She was especially vocal in speaking against the insurance abortion coverage ban amendment, speaking on behalf of all the women whose lives would be at risk because of no exceptions for the health of the mother or fetal abnormality.



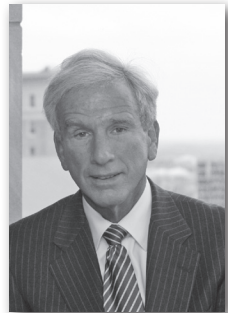

Senate Honor Roll



Senator Mary Margaret Whipple (D-31) fought hard for the woman of Virginia this session, voting against all anti-choice attacks. She led the charge in speaking against the insurance abortion coverage ban amendment, on behalf of all the women whose lives would be at risk because there was no health of the mother or fetal abnormality exceptions. She also submitted a budget amendment that would require the Commissioner of Health to submit applications for federal funding that requires no state general fund match to educate adolescents on both abstinence and contraception to prevent pregnancy and sexually transmitted infections.

Senator Richard L. Saslaw, the Majority Leader of the Virginia Senate, has demonstrated time and again his commitment to protecting women's rights, especially when it comes to reproductive freedom. During a heated floor debate, he stated, "If I thought for one minute that this was about women's health, I would throw a green light up there, but it's not. This legislation will do nothing more than restrict access to safe abortion procedures for the women of the Commonwealth."





Senator Ralph S. Northam (D-6) was a champion for young people across the Commonwealth by offering a bill this session that would require each school division to implement the standards of learning for the family life education, with the goals of reducing the incidence of pregnancy, sexually transmitted disease, and substance abuse among teenagers. Additionally, this bill would require any curricula or materials used to be evidence-based and supported by peer reviewed medical research. This bill passed the Senate but failed in the House Education committee.

Senator Janet Howell (D32) fought hard for the women in Virginia this session, as she has done year after year, voting against all anti-choice attacks, and offering her constant voice in committee and on the floor. She led the charge on the floor to defeat the targeted regulation of abortion provider's amendment to SB 924. We also continue express our gratitude for finally passing a pro-choice license plate in Virginia last year.
